The following document is from the Glen Rock Historical & Preservation Society's files. Although it does not appear to be specific to the Glen Rock area (part of Franklin Township – named for Governor William Franklin, the illegitimate son of Benjamin Franklin – in 1872) or even to New Jersey, the following rules are highly entertaining by 21st Century standards. Something similar was undoubtedly in force for the area's school districts at that time, including Ridgewood-Grove District #44 aka The Little Red Schoolhouse at the corner of Rock Road and Ackerman Avenue.

"Rules for Teachers, 1872"

- 1. Teachers each day will fill lamps, clean chimneys.
- 2. Each teacher will bring a bucket of water and a scuttle of coal for the day's session.
- 3. Make your pens carefully. You may whittle nibs to the individual taste of the pupils.
- 4. Men teachers may take one evening each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go to church regularly.
- 5. After ten hours in school, the teachers may spend the remaining time reading the Bible or other good books.
- 6. Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.
- 7. Every teacher should lay aside from each pay a goodly sum of his earnings for his benefit during his declining years so that he will not become a burden on society.
- 8. Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool or public halls, or gets shaved in a barber shop will give good reason to suspect his worth, intention, integrity and honesty.
- 9. The teacher who performs his labor faithfully and without fault for five years will be given an increase of twenty-five cents per week in his pay, providing the Board of Education approves.
