STRIKING LABORERS INVADE GLEN ROCK

Serene and peaceful Glen Rock suffered a brief halt in its tranquil march last Thursday morning, when a gang of striking laborers numbering about fifty entered the Borough with the purpose of making a demonstration and causing the laborers employed throughout the Borough to lay down their tools and join the ranks of strikers. They separated into groups and approached the men doing grading on Doremus Avenue those working in Hamilton Avenue Park, and the Bergen Aqueduct Company's laborers at work on Ackerman Avenue. At first they confined their tactics to the use of mild arguments; then they descended to coercion, even threatening to shoot any who transgressed their edicts. At length they enlisted in their ranks all the unskilled laborers in the Borough with the exception of two who remained at work doing grading on Rodney Street for the Smith-Singer Realty Company.

Looking for new fields to conquer, the several groups of strikers reassembled with their recruits and set their faces toward Ridgewood. At about 8:30 A. M. they were moving north in loose formation on South Maple Avenue near Clifton place, when three or four automobiles carrying Under-Sheriff Heath and his deputies and the Ridgewood police bore down upon the strikers from the direction in which the later [sic] were traveling. The officers left their machines and ordered the gang to turn about and move in the opposite direction. The strikers refused to obey the officers, whereupon the latter enforced their mandates by using their clubs upon several of the leaders. The strikers then turned about and with shiftless amble and sullen mien moved Patersonward.

LAST MINUTE NEWS: STRIKERS ATTACK WORKMEN

A crowd of Italian laborers surrounded the building, on the grounds of the Ridgewood Country Club in which are the bunks of the workmen who are putting the golf course into shape, and attempted to lay siege to the men with revolvers and shot-guns. The attacking party was surrounded by a number of constables, deputies and officers from Glen Rock, Ridgewood and Hawthorne. As THE OBSERVER goes to press with the last form the firing can be heard and the town in the vicinity of the station is over-run with defenders of the Borough. There is of course no doubt that the besieging party will be dispersed and some of its members arrested.
