## DEATH OF FIFTY YEAR RESIDENT OF GLEN ROCK

William Folley of Doremus Avenue Passes Away After Eight Weeks' Illness. One of the borough's oldest residents passed away on Monday when William Folley of Doremus avenue succumbed to stomach trouble after an illness of approximately eight weeks.

Born in Wyckoff fifty years ago he came to Glen Rock in 1875 with his parents, Abraham W. Folley, born in Saddle River, and Hester Ann Marinus, a native of Glen Rock. Mrs. Folley was a member of the old Marinus family, and at the time the family moved to Glen Rock they came back to occupy the old homestead on Doremus avenue. Both parents died some years ago.

Mr. Folley was of a retiring disposition, living in the family home now kept by his sister, Mrs. Jennie Robertson up till the time of his death. He was however a charter member of the Ridgewood chapter Jr. O.U.A.M. at the time of its organization. In business he was twenty-five years in the employ of the Manhattan Shirt Mills of Paterson. At the time of his death, he represented the N.Y. and N.J. Well Co., spending some time on the road but always at home over the weekend. His close association with his home and family leaves a gap in the home circle which is most keenly felt by the surviving members as well as his friends.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at 2 p.m. at the late home. Rev. W. J. Lonsdale officiated. Interment was in Valleau.

Surviving are three brothers, Harry of Goshen, John Edward of North Paterson, and Frank of Rock Road, Glen Rock, and three sisters, Mrs. Jennie Robertson, with whom he lived, Mrs. Margaret Marinus of Ferndale, and Mrs. Rachael Montress of 424 Doremus avenue, living next door.
